GERMAN OLYMPIAN PACES SKI JUMPING

Keller Breaks Hill Record in Rosendale Event

ROSENDALE, N.Y., Jan. 25
—Franz Keller, West Germany's 1968 Olympic gold medal winner in the combined Nordic, set a new hill record today in winning the first half of the annual Rosendale international ski jumping tournament.

man youth combined near flawless jumping form with flights of 204 and 212 feet for 216 points to dominate a field of nine Class A jumpers representing five countries.

Keller's second jump of 212 feet shattered the previous hill record of 208 feet set by Don Colby of Lake Placid in the 1968 event. Keller was awarded 48.5 form points on his first jump and 51.5 on the second.

Ludvig Zajc, Yugoslavia's two-time Olympic, placed

second with leaps of 200 and 203 feet for 208 points. Giacomo Amoni, the Italian national champion, took third place with 202.5 points on leaps of 198 and 204 feet. Dana Zelenakis of Canaan College, who showed excellent form in the recent Kennedy memorial games at Lake Placid, got off to a good start with a leap of 201 feet and 55.5 form points

but fell to 183 feet on his second try and finished fourth with a total of 188.1 points.

The winner of the combined Class B and Veterans group, which were combined for today's tournament, was Colby of Tahoe Paradise College, who watched Keller break his hill mark today. Colby had leaps of 145 feet and 172 feet for a point total of 141.3. Fred Way

of Mount Beacon, N. Y., with jumps of 148 and 152 feet for 121 points, was second.

The tournament was delayed for nearly an hour between the practice jumps and the regular competition while tournament officials reduced the inrun about three feet because of dangerous conditions on the jump area.
